




A significant aspect of the dissemination strategy was to inform the participants that the event was organized as an international conference, that attendance was free and that certificates of participation would be offered to all participants.



All speakers stressed the importance of E2R validation and facilitation and the opportunity of the project. The event was moderated by Daniel Dejica and Oscar García Muñoz. Interpretation for the language pair English-Romanian was offered for the entire period of the event.





The morning session of the event consisted in a series of presentations given by the project members and was closed by a joint presentation given by the T2V advisory board members.







Training and employment in Italy - The reverse journey of a streetcar named T2V





- The most relevant replies which demonstrate the needs identified by Train2Validate project have been selected.

### Age, education and gender




- The majority of the respondents were between 51 and over 61 of age. This shows if there is a strong correlation between age and subsequent opinions and behavioural traits.
- · They all have a Master or a P.h.D. degree.
- Perceptions differ among survey respondents when they are compared by gender: the percentage of female survey respondents was three times higher than that of the male ones.





### 5. PARTICIPATION AND IMPACT

456 persons from 29 countries registered to ME1, and 179 persons from 27 countries attended ME1 (the number of participants and their geographical distribution are presented in the following charts). The number of the actual participants does not include the attendees from the project partners' institutions or organizations. All participants and speakers were sent certificates of attendance by email.


#### Registration: 456 registrations from 29 countries








### Participation: 179 participants from 27 countries

Analyzing the registration and participation figures (456 registrations, respectively 179 participants), and the widespread geographic representation of the persons who registered or attended the event (29, respectively 27 countries), and given that the topic of the conference was highly specialized, we consider that from these perspectives, the conference was highly successful, even if we did not



manage to meet the Erasmus+ indicator (minimum 214 online participants, excluding the partner organizations).

The impact and visibility of the event were also insured by a series of actions, including streaming the event live on YouTube, posting and commenting in real time on social platforms (Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter), writing post-event comments, and last but not least, sending individual Thank-you emails with the certificates of participation to all participants.

### 6. ACCESSIBILITY OF THE EVENT

In order to follow the accessibility protocol of the project for multiplier events, we accomplished the following accessibility tasks:

  - Indications to guests about how to conduct their speeches to adapt to people with comprehension difficulties in the audience
- Evaluation form
  - Text in a unique version as easy-to-read

Additionally to our protocol, we have also included these measures:

- Using a QR code for registration in the ME1 program
- Offering a link in the program to the Zoom support page (tutorials for using Zoom)
- Offering information on different time zones for the program of the event





- Sending emails with the detailed program to all the participants
- Offering a bilingual tutorial (English-Romanian) on how to use the interpreting function in Zoom
- Streaming the event live on YouTube
- Posting and commenting live on social platforms during the event.

#### 7. SATISFACTION SURVEY

The satisfaction survey was drafted and disseminated by the Quality Manager, who also collected the answers. The survey consisted of 5 multiple-choice questions and of an open question, where participants could add their comments, and was filled out by 45 persons. The survey is presented in Annex 2. The overall feedback was extremely positive.

#### 8. KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

The key performance indicators for the event include:

- Number of registrations to the event: 456
- Number of participants: 179 (indicator not met, the minimum number of online participants in Erasmus+ MEs is 214)
- Widespread geographic representation of the participants: 27 countries

- Presence of 2 advisory board members, who also gave a joint speech
- Satisfaction level of attendees, obtained through satisfaction surveys: high.


